At the top of President Biden's agenda will be renewing New START, the critical treaty with Russia that is set to expire otherwise in February 2021. It is the only agreement remaining that binds the US and Russia together in limiting their nuclear arsenals, and has provided necessary verifications that both parties have abided by its conditions. To move forward toward further reductions, New START must first be renewed. https://www.armscontrol.org/factsheets/NewSTART is an excellent resource about this treaty. Russian President Putin has said he would agree to its renewal, but Donald Trump has failed to negotiate in good faith. So far, the treaty is in jeopardy of termination.

There is new emphasis on eliminating ICBMs, the third leg of the nuclear offense triad. According to recent analysis by the Union of Concerned Scientists, ICBMs are approaching the end of their service life, in terms of physical and technological reliability, and the latest round of military spending approved by Congress this year would commit to a wholesale replacement of these missiles with 600 new ones at a cost of \$100 Billion. Because these missiles and their warheads are all sitting ducks in their silos, they would be easily targeted and destroyed in any nuclear exchange, and in addition are less reliable than submarine launched, they should be all dismantled instead. Think of the health care and nutritional relief that amount of money could provide. Already proposals have been made in Congress to do just that, and there will be more. WA Representative Adam Smith chairs the House Armed Services Committee. Lobbying him and his colleagues will be one of our tasks in the new year. The ICAN Treaty to Prohibit Nuclear Weapons achieved ratification by 50 nations last month. This began a 90 day countdown to its becoming international law. That date is January 22, 2021, the day after our new president's inauguration, and this link https://www.ploughshares.org/issues-analysis/article/nuclear-weapons-are-illegal explains its relevance in world affairs. For one aspect, the treaty nations, none of whom now possess nuclear weapons, become a unified coalition to apply political and economic pressure on the 9 nations that do. For our work, this will boost the perception of our message, that nuclear weapons are immoral and illegitimate. They rightly belong in the same category as chemical weapons, land mines, and cluster bombs, disproportionately destructive of civilians, and must be banned, everywhere and forever..

Tritium alert: the National Nuclear Security Administration is preparing to approve the Los Alamos National Laboratory's (LANL's) controversial plan to vent up to 100,000 curies of tritium gas. Tritium is a radioactive isotope of hydrogen, used to boost the explosive power of nuclear weapons. Most vented tritium will condense into water vapor which can then be readily ingested by living organisms, including humans. Fetuses are particularly at risk.

LANL's nuclear weapons budget has doubled over the last decade to \$2.9 billion in fiscal year 2021. But funding for so-called cleanup has remained flat at around \$220 million, or 8% that of nuclear weapons. In fact, LANL plans to "cap and cover" some 200,000 cubic yards of radioactive and toxic wastes, leaving them permanently buried in unlined pits above our groundwater, some three miles uphill from the Rio Grande, and call it cleaned up. To add to this, the Lab now plans to vent tritium into the air. https://nukewatch.org/ has much more information.

Book review: <u>Gambling with Armageddon</u>, by Martin J. Sherwin, 2020. Subtitled "Nuclear Roulette from Hiroshima to the Cuban Missile Crisis, 1945-1962", this book fills in lots of historical details about the showdown between Nikita Krushchev and John Kennedy that came very close to blowing up the world. Much closer than we ever knew. Using previously unrevealed resources to correct many long held beliefs and assumptions, Sherwin tells a frightening, and enlightening story, starring pride, prejudice, and dumb luck. I have the book, and you may borrow it.

We can grow more sensibly as an effective peace organization if we know what our members and supporters expect of us.
